Event Overview:

Players participating in this charitable game have committed to fundraising a minimum of \$500 each to contribute to our cause. Under the umbrella society we have also changed the Lloyd Handivan to the new name of the "Border City Express". We continue to provide transportation for the last 40 years to community members with mobility and intellectually challenges

BORDER CITY CAREAVAN

This service Is operated 100% by volunteers and provides transportation for both able bodied and challenged community members to "out of town" non-emergency medical appointments utilizing minivans as the means of transportation. It is a door-to-door service and we supply the vehicle, fuel, volunteer driver and the volunteer coordinator who looks after all the logistics.

BORDER CITY SHUTTLE

Provides shuttle services for any kind of event or tour and offers a "Safe Ride Home" service for all staff and corporate functions.

BORDER CITY TRISHAW

This a 3 wheeled cycle used as a recreational activity that is designed to accommodate seniors and community members with challenges to get out and have a volunteer take them on a bike ride and let the air blow through their hair. Much research has been done on how it assists individuals that may be feeling loneliness and isolation

BORDER CITY PARAMOBILE

The all-terrain Para-Mobile with its patented "stand-up device" has many innovative uses for sports such as golf, fishing, riflery and also social events. Thanks to this piece of equipment, our community wheelchair users are discovering a new and unimagined level of freedom and independence. Being able to stand up boosts self-esteem - one can finally standup facing others at eye level - and has a therapeutic effect.
